THEMSELVES, AND POSITIVELY IMPACT THEIR LIVES.





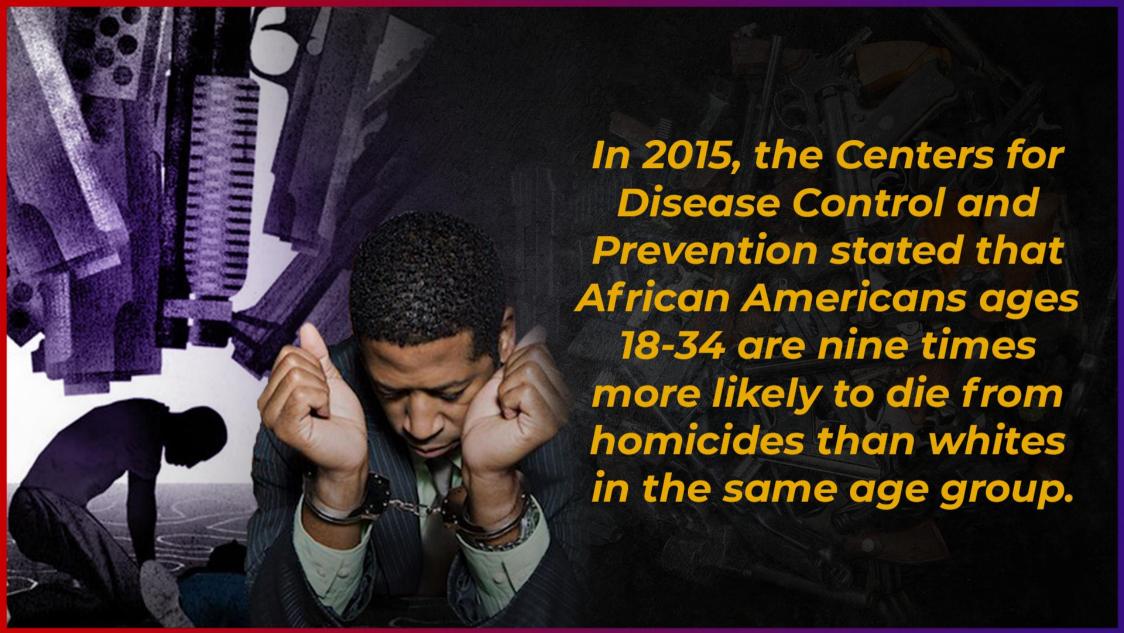
Having an identified career path and steady income is essential in curbing the gun violence that has overwhelmingly engulfed the Jacksonville community. According to an article published in the Juvenile Justice Information Exchange in December 2021, Jacksonville, Florida, has been named the gun-murder capitol. It was further reported that since the 1970s, Jacksonville's rate had surpassed the state's and nation's.

In 2015, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention stated that African Americans ages 18-34 are nine times more likely to die from homicides than whites in the same age group. Therefore, **The Exodus Film School** is being launched in 2022 as a tool for black males between the ages of 12 and 17 to receive education on film theory, hands-on film training, and a mentor.

Research shows that providing legitimate activities and opportunities such as **The Exodus Film School** is an effective strategy to curtail and negate gun-violence. WHYY.org, a partnership with National Public Radio and PBS, shared a new study out of Philadelphia, PA that states there is a direct correlation between chronic unemployment and gun violence. The results of this research conducted in 2021, identifies the need for "employment initiatives that include training and mentorship" (Moselle, WHYY, 2021). The Exodus Film School will partner with crime control professionals, public health and health professionals, victim's families, educators, lawmakers, criminologists, community members, the armed services, the Federal Communications Commission, and the U.S. Civil Rights Commission who can all advocate and help save our youth from gun violence.

Exodus Film School introduces participants to the first principles of cinematography and camerawork while integrating principles of self-awareness, self-management, social awareness, relationship skills and responsible decision making. Students will complete Exodus Film School having gained technical skills to creatively express themselves though film, as well as valuable social and emotional skills to positively impact their daily lives.





Exodus Film School is a program created by author, Pastor and Jacksonville, FL native, E-C Weston. Weston has more than 20 years of experience in working with youth and is surrounded by a host of talented experts from the entertainment industry to curate an immersive camp that explores every aspect of film production, videography, and creative writing.

In addition to the hard skills learned, youth will also learn healthy social and emotional skills and that by possessing such skills, are more likely to succeed in school, work, and life. Students will learn how to practice responsible decision making, implement positive thinking and build relationship skills such as how to effectively resolve conflict. Students will also learn how to resist negative social pressure, manage stress and anxiety and learn social norms. At The Exodus Film School, you will find the recipe for achievement in curtailing gun-violence and giving our youth a creative opportunity at success.
